

#### MARTIN N. HINE.

MARTIN N. HINE. Mr. Hine was born at Meredith, Delaware county, N. Y., Nov. 15, 1829; was reared in that county and re-moved to Cannon, Kent county, Mich., Nov., 1847. He went to Cali-fornia in 1852. An account of this long, perilous and (to many) fatal journey, written by Mr. Hine, was printed in this paper about three years ago. He returned to Michi-gan the next year and removed to Lowell in 1855, where he has since reaided.

resided. Mr. Hine erected many of the early buildings in Lowell, including the Central school house and the Congre-gational church. He engaged in the drug business in 1861 and was in the dry goods trade from 1865 to 1874. He was assistant cashier of the Low-ell Netional hour for ity sears and Freda of Lowell. For many years Mr. Mueller has been identified with the Grand Army of the Republic, being a charter mem-ber of Joseph Wilson Post at its founding, Oct. 16, 1882, and has held important official positions in the ell National bank for six years and its president four years. 

DENLY CALLED.

A martin N. Hine died Sunday evening at his home in this village, at ter a long decline and an illness of several weeks, aged 72 years. Funcral services were held at his late residence Tuesday afternoon, conducted by his old friend, Rev. J. T. Husted, former pastor of Lowell Congregational church, now of Durand. The burial at Oakwood cemetery was conducted by Lowell Lodge, F. & A. M., W. A. Watts, W. M. and called the attention of the Judge, who quickly had brought from his private office a couch, upon which the stricken man was placed. Coro-ner LeRoy, who was in the building, was summoned and administered stimulants; but within fifteen min-utes from the time his condition was first noticed, Mr. Mueller was dead. The body was brought home ves.

The body was brought home yes-terday; and the funeral will be held at the Methodist church Friday at 2, p. m. His comrade, S. P. Hicks, kindly furnishes the following brief sketch of the deceased's life and ser-

vices. Theodore Mueller was born in Prussia December 22, 1832, being an only child. In 1863, he came to America, landing in New York City. December 18, 1863, he enlisted, a vol-unteer in Company E, 8th N. Y. Heavy Artillery. He served with this regiment and the 10th N. Y. Vol-unteer Infantry, Company I, until the close of the war; and washonor-ably discharged at Balley's Cross Roads, Va., June 30, 1865. His ser-vice was in the Army of the Poto-mac. He fought in the terrible bat-tles of the Wilderness campaign, Petties of the Wilderness campaign, Pet-ersburg, Spottsylvania, Cold Har-bor and the Wilderness. Nor was bor and the Wilderness. Nor was this his only experience as a soldier. For eight months he was confined in those fearful dens, Rebel prisons, at Libby and Saulsbury. Soon after his discharge from the army he came to Grand Rapids, where, on Oct. 23, 1866, he married Margnretha Koch, who survives him. Two years later they came to Lowell, which has since been their home. To them fourteen children have been born, eight of whom are living, to-wit: Mrs. Edward Walz, Mrs. Arthur Harner and Mrs. Harry Fink, of Chicago; Miss Margaret Mueller, of Eigin, III.; Mrs. Paul St-Clair, of Jersey City, N.
