Old Auto Plates

N.G. After Mar. 25

The Department of State will issue weight tax refund checks at the rate of \$1000 a day, if possible. Secretary of State Frank D. Fitzgerald announced last week. Refunds are to be made to both purchasers of 1934 license plates and to purchasers of the half-price windshield permits. In all about 250,000 motorists will be entitled to refunds. These range, for the most part, from \$5 to \$8. The speed of refunding is governed by the state's check-writing equipment. It was decided that the purchase of additional equipment would be a waste of money. For that reason, about ten weeks will be required to mail out all refund checks. The refunds will be sent from the main office in Lansing. Branch offices, which issued the plates, will not make refunds.

Motorists, under the extension of time allowed by Mr. Fitzgerald, may use 1933 license plates until March 25. After that date, motorists must have 1934 plates or windshield permits which allow the use of 1933 plates until August 1.
