### **Again Enrolling** For C.C.C. Camps

More than 3,000 boys and young men of Michigan will have an op-portunity during October to en-roll in the Civilian Conservation corps for service in the 59 camps scattered through the northern part of the state. The actual quota allowed Michigan by the United States Department of Labor for the six months' period ending March 31, as announced by Wm. Haber, state relief administrator, is 3,050.

Allocation of county quotas is now under way and applicants

may enroll at the office of their county relief administrator from October 1 to 20. The age range october 1 to 20. The age range for eligibles is from 18 to 26 years. So far as possible, the boys will be taken from families on the relief rolls or in danger of becoming dependent, and they must be in good physical condition as determined by a thorough medical examination. al examination.

Recruits are paid at the rate of \$30 per month in addition to their maintenance. Of this amount \$25 is sent directly to the family or other designated dependents and \$5 is retained by the camp worker

so is retained by the camp worker for personal expenses.

The 3,050 who will go to camp in October will take the place of those whose terms of service are expiring at the end of September.
