## **New Ruling Establishes Grades** For Eggs

## Sale By Pound **Not Practical**

Returning to the basic egg law of 1927-28, Commissioner John B. Strange has signed Michigan Ruling No. 660 governing the sale of eggs. This ruling replaces the order providing for the sale of eggs by the pound, rather than by the dozen, cancelled August 1st by Commissioner Strange as impractical. The section of the new order providing against the sale of inedible eggs will be strictly enforced in an attempt to improve the quality of eggs being sold at retail throughout the state, according to the agricultural department head. The new ruling establishes grades for eggs, complying with federal standards, for dealers who might desire to handle eggs of this quality. The four grades established are to be known as Michigan Fancy, Michigan Grade A, Michigan Grade B, and Michigan Grade , with the ruling providing definitions for each.
