

Aphis eggs are black shiny deposits in masses on rough spots on the tree and also found on water sprouts.

Controls are not difficult. An oil spray containing at least three percent actual oil will serve for treating scale and red mites. This spray can be put on as a dormant spray during suitable weather conditions before spring opens up.

For the aphis control Hutson says it is possible to obtain oil sprays containing materials that will cut down the aphis hatch, although the usual oil spray is not affective.




