Someone Will Be Burned to Death

There are 8,760 hours in a year. Each year there are about 10,000 persons burned to death . . . average of 27 each day. That's more than one every hour. It is a terrible way to die. Along with these deaths there is a devastating amount, of property destroyed by fire—more than 300 million dollars worth. Probably three-fourths of the fires could be prevented by a little care.
