"The muscles and organs of the uman body need oxygen to do their tasks. Blood carries oxygen to the muscles and organs. But ordinarily one minute is required for the blood to make a circuit of the body. During intense muscular exertion the blood will hurry around the cir cuit in 15 seconds. Any good sprint-er can do a 100-yard dash in much less time than that. And so the body uses the oxygen it already has

An athlete, Dr. Keys explained, can't hold his breath for that long, and besides the body hasn't stored

"In the early part of a longer run," he explained, "a boy uses up what energy is stored and an oxygen 'debt' is created, and this debt must be paid. The heart and lungs work overtime to carry blood and oxygen through the body to help."

Why Metal Is Colder Than Wood On a cold day a piece of metal feels much colder to the hand than a piece of wood, notwithstanding the fact that both must have the same temperature. The explanation is that metal, being a much better conductor of heat than wood removes heat from the hand more rapidly, giving the impression that it is colder. In general, the better a conductor the colder it will feel
