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

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
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Trooper Talks to Jr. Farm Bureau

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

20 Herds Finish the Year

The South Kent County Cow Testing Association finished another year's work last week with the holding of the annual meeting. Twenty herds finished the year with an average of 368 cows on test. Average production of milk was 4,233 pounds with 3724 pounds of fat. Eighteen herds averaged over 300 pounds of butterfat per cow.

Game Management

We were surprised to learn that game management areas in Kent county for last year totaled 4,000 acres. Officers representing these groups met last week in Grand Rapids to discuss their problems with Russell G. Hill, of Michigan State College, G. W. Eradt, of the Conservation department. These men report farmers very well satisfied with this method of game management and hunters control. One objection to the plan was to the effect that most areas are too large. A section of land is thought to be the right size.

Another Summer Club

The second summer club to be organized for 1941 was set up last week in Oakland township. Projects to be carried are largely dairy with some potatoes. The Kent County Conservation League which has sponsored several of these groups is planning to assist in organizing more this season.

Big Dairy Event

One of the outstanding dairy events for Michigan this year will be the annual meeting of the Holstein Friesian Association of America which meets at East Lansing the first week of June. With this meeting will be held the Brentwood sale of Holstein cattle.

156 Poisonous Weeds

Stopped in at Malcolm Trout's office in the dairy building at Michigan State College a while back. One of the new bulletins on Michigan weeds was on his desk. Weeds were discussed and their effect on the dairy business. Then Trout asked me if I knew how many plants there were in Michigan that were poisonous or injurious in some way or another to man and animals. We didn't know. There are 156 according to survey made by Dr. E. F. Woodcock, of the Botany Department at Michigan State College. You would be surprised at some plants in this list that are injurious and yet are very common.

Did You Know That

It will take 36 pounds of scoured wool or the average production of 10 sheep to equip and cloth each United States soldier? When viewed in terms of equipping the entire personnel of our armed forces these requirements result in staggering totals. To outfit 4,000,000 men will require the total shorn wool of 48,000,000 breeding sheep of the United States in one year. This makes no provision for civilian needs.
