Thanksgiving week marked the opening of the 38th annual sale of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals which is handled in Kent county by the Grand Rapids Anti-tuberculosis Society. In the towns and rural ereas this sale is conducted through two methods-by mail to a list of several thousand business places and homes and through the schools for those people who do not receive their seals by mail. If the rerson who receives seals by mail wants to help the school children who work for room prizes, money may be placed in the little return envelope which is enclosed in each package of seals, and sent to the teacher. Credit will then be given to the person who buys the seals and the room of the child who made the

School Commissioner Lynn H. Clark is chairman for the sale in the county. 'No doubt the work of the Tuberculosis Society is so well known throughout the county that It seems like repetition to tell how the money is spent. It is important to know, however, that all students in the large town high and grade schools of the county are offered tuberculin tests every two years and all positive reactors are given chest xrays. Free chest clinics held throughout the county keep under observation suspicious and healed cases of tuberculosis so break downs may be avoided. A nurse especially trained does home follow-up, teaching people the meaning of good nutrition, proper rest and good hygiene. New books on health-ful living, posters and other de-vices are provided for our schools and throughout the year a constant program of disease prevention is conducted by the society's staff. 
