





More prolonged deficiency of vitamembers of the Sophomore class min A results in dry scaly skin with skin have been successfully treated by using vitamin A. This vitamin is also essential for proper formation and maintenance of tooth enamel and for successful reproduction.

There are animal and vegetable sources of vitamin A. These are cod liver and other fish liver oils, liver, milk and dairy products, and yellow and green leafy vegetables. The vitamin A from animal sources is somewhat better utilized than that from vegetables, and both should be included in the diet,

Strange Fish strangest of all fishes. It resem bles a marine shark more than a fresh water fish. In fact, when it was first classified over a hundred years ago, it was incorrectly placed with the sharks. However, when more thoroughly studied it was found to be a primitive bony fish and not a shark. It is lead colored and has a mooth skin from which the scales have practically disappeared.

The paddlefish grows to well over 150 pounds. It is rarely ever taken on hook and line, but is usually caught by seining. The fiesh is excellent and is practically boneless, as the skeleton is cartilaginous. In some southern localities, this species is the most highly prized food fish. The eggs make excellent caviar and in many parts of the South constitute an important product of the com Ellis Auto Electric mercial fisheries.

> Equalize Heat
> One of the most interesting new developments in the heating indus-try which will be available for postwar homes is the floor level radiant heating system. The system con-sists of a hollow metal baseboard which takes the place of the con-ventional wooded baseboard. The unit is installed around the exposed walls of the house or other type of building to be heated. University engineers found that the low source of radiant heat in the unit produces a uniform feeling of comfort among the occupants of a room. Remarkably small differences in temperature at the floor and at the ceiling level were observed. With outdoo emperatures of approximately 30 degrees, a ceiling to floor temperature difference of about 1.5 degrees was obtained with the new type of baseboard radiation.

'V' Belta "V" belts can be used satisfacorily on a combination of "V" and flat pulleys, provided certain pre-cautions are observed. The flat or driven pulley should be at least three times the diameter of the "V" drive pulley, and that the distance between the pulley shafts be about equal to the diameter of the larger pulley. It is also well to have the face of the flat pulley perfectly straight instead of crowned, since otherwise the belts will tend to ride the high center. Although belt tension can be maintained by means of motor-frame adjusting screws, much more constant tension is secured by mounting the motor on a rocking or hinged support so that its weight is partially carried by the drive belt.
