much as 10.000 pounds a day—five tons—in imitation of Butter. Some 375,000 pounds of this fraudalent product flooded New England before Haddad was caught in 1935. Right here in Michigan, as recent as March 17, 1949, surant operator in Bronson was convicted of selling yellow cleo as Butter—spread upon toast. Two Michigan Department of Agriculture investigators entered this est-ablishment and ordered Buttered Toast. They received toast-but it was spread with Yellow Oleo.






