The emaciated and lifeless frame which held so brave a spirit lies on the bed in the vatican beside which almost all the world has prayed. The red damask coverlet rests lightly over the body, the cardinal's scarlet cape is about the shoulders, while on his head has been placed the papal hood of velvet, bordered with ermine, and in the hands which have blessed so many thousands has been placed a crucifix.

Will Lie in State. To-day the sacred college of cardinals will assemble for the impressive ceremony of officially pronouncing Pope Leo dead. After this sad function has been performed the body will be taken to the small throne room adjoining the death chamber, where it will be embalmed. The funeral caremopies will extend over nine days, the remains being removed to the cathedral of St. Peter's, where they will lie in state. The ultimate resting place of the dead pontiff will be in the magnificent basilica of St. John the Lateran.

His Last Hours. Pope Leo's final moments were marked by that same serenity and devotion, and when he was conscious, that calm intelligence which is assoclated with his 25 years' pontificate. His was no easy death. An hour before he died, turning to Dr. Lapponi and his devoted valet, Pio Centra, he murmured, "The pain I suffer is most terrible." Yet his parting words were not of the physical anguish that he suffered, but were whispered benedictions upon the cardinals and his nephews, who knelt at the bedside, and the last look of his almost sightless eyes was towards the great ivory crucifix hanging in the death chamber. Practically all the cardinals now in Rome, kneel-ing at the bedside, watched the passage of his soul.

Statement by Dr. Lapponi. Of this supreme moment Dr. Lapponi gives an impressive description. He said: "Death occurred through exhaustion, although in the last two hours Pope Leo made a supreme effort to gather together all his energies. He succeeded in recognizing those about him by the sound of their voices, as his sight was almost entirely lost. Still he made a marvelous display of his energy, and even his death was really grand. It was resigned, calm and serene. Very few examples can be given of a man of such advanced age after so exhaustive an illness showing such supreme courage in dy-







Wood, a young and inexperienced man, will at the next turn of the wheel be advanced to the head of the army, where he will remain until all the old veterans have been buried; unless, as might happen in actual war, Wood should be removed for incompetency. Such miserable injustice as this would mar the reputation of a Washington or a Lincoln; and the Senate shoud refuse to confirm.

WHAT would you pay a man to drive all over the village of Lowell, and all over the rural mail routes of this and adjoining towns, visiting one thousand homes and telling each member of each family of the goods you have to sell, their merits, low prices, etc.? A man and team could not do the job for \$25 and do it as well as THE LEDGER will for \$1. Can you spend \$1. better? Not if you are a live man and want to do business. Of course, if you "keep" goods, instead of selling them, this does not mean you. Something for nothing is usually worth nothing; and those who think to obtain an education without work will get little or nothing of value.

BECAUSE WE despise the miser is no reason we should admire a spendthrift. Both of these are enemies of society. Which is the greater nuisance, men are still discussing, as they have for lo these many years. Just at this time, when work is plenty and wages good, we daily see shameful examples of foolish wastefulness. With another Winter approaching, with its certainty of high-priced fuel, and last Winter's experience fresh in our minds, the man who has been responsible for bringing a family of helpless children into the world should, now b making provision for the "rainy day" that is certainly approaching. When such a man spends his wages as fast as drawn for whisky and tobacco for his own miserably depraved appetites and for "treats" for fellows as worthless as himself, he is worse than a miser; yes, he is treading close to criminal ground. No man has a right to bring children into the world to be known as "drunkard's brats;" and the wretch who does it, if he does not reform, should be imprisioned and made to work for the maintenance of his family, without an opportunity to pour his wages down his gluttonous gullet in liquid damnation. These are hard words; but they do not do justice to the subject. If this paragraph comes to the notice of any man whom the coat fits we urge him to put it on, God knows it's the only coat he is likely to have, if he pays all his money over the bar for "devil's broth."
