

## WHITING CONFESSES

FORMER LOWELL BOY AD-MITS HIS GUILT.

Condemned to Hang for Murder of Matthew Conway.

White's animus in writing appears to be partly a desire to exonerate 'Kid White," whose true name is to be partly a desire to exonerate John Hildebrant, who is under sen-tence for a share in the same crime, and partly enmity for the man, the

"I know that I am the cause of his getting that bullet in the side, and I thank God that it was not worse. Had she lived it is needless to say I would have been a better boy. say I would have been a better boy, and would not today have the gallows staring me in the face, but she dled at a time when I most needed her good influence and care. I was left to the care of my father, who at that time was serving a sentence for embezzlement in the state's prison at Jackson, Mich. My father was soon released from the penitentiary took me away from the good home of my grandmother. With him I soon learned many things that were not good for me. As my father took to drinking harder and harder I ran away from him, and it was not long away from him, and it was not long before I landed in the reform school, which did me more harm than good.






