The above represents the new block recently completed by F. T. King. It adjoins the post office on the west and is two stories high. The four stores are occupied by Bradish & Son, harness, W. B. Rickert, confectioner, Klumpp & White, meat market and M. T. Tyler, notion bazaar. In the second story, the "Tent" on the bay window at the right shows where the Maccabees have located. Their dining room is in the rear of the adjoining floor. Dr. Eaton has offices over Rickert's; and Dr. Snyder, dentist, has he whole floor over Tyler.

Altogether it is a very substantial and handsome improvement: and it ooks as if Mr. King had done a good season's work both for the Village and himself.

THE LOWELL LUMBER COMPANY'S NEW OFFICES.

Lumber Company are pleasantly established in their new office two blocks south of Main street, on the west side of the road. The building has been raised five feet and is well above the high water mark. The main office is a room fourteen by sixteen feet, well lighted by two large windows on the north and the east from which good views are obtained of the



surrounding landscape. The woodwork in this room is of yellow pine finished in ma hogany and across the north side is a beautiful desk of quarter-sawed oak. The private office, which opens off the other, is twelve by twelve feet, is finished in oak and fitted with desk and other conveniences. There are two cloak rooms, one opening from each office. The remainder of the building forms a lumber and work-room, twenty-two by one hundred seven feet. The company is re-roofing the old Lowell & Hastings depot and by Spring expects to have its lumber entirely housed in the two buildings, with a covered walk going from the office to the storehouse and to the cement-house, which is south of the others.



From Our Point of View

THE Grand Rapids Herald takes to task Governor Vardaman of Mississippi for what he says on the race problem in his message to the legislature. It is a good thing for the Northern editors that the Negro question is a long way off; for some of them are like the orator who said he could talk the best o the things he knew the least about. We have known many of our townsmen who from time to time have gone from among us to Southern states; and never one of them, to our knowledge, who has not experienced a total change of heart regarding the race problem, or has become vastly more tolerant of the Southgern view. Governor Vardaman may be mistaken in blaming education for the increasing criminality which he alleges in the colored race; but he is not alone among intelligent Southerners in holding that opinion. Several months ago, the writer met the genial pastor of a Methodist church South, who informed us that he was raised" By an old black mammy in Tennessee. Asked whether the Negro has improved under freedom, he expressed his opinion that he has not. He alluded to the faithfulness of Negro overseers, left in charge of plantations, homes and women and children, while the planters and their sons were away to war; and declared that it is a matter of record that not one ever proved a traitor to his trust: but he believed the Negro of today is inferior morally to the slave of forty years ago. It is the candid opinion of many good people that in educating the Negro, we have simply increased his capacity for evil doing. While they may not agree with that proposition, Northern people have come to realize more fully the enormity of the task confronting the South, and to be more lenient in their judgments.

IN A RECENT communication received at this office, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction calls attention to brequent violations or neglect to observe the requirements of the school laws. In at least two important details the officers of District No. 1 are at fault and THE LEDGER desires at this time, midway between two annual meetings, to kindly call the Mark attention of the Board and taxpayers to them .- First: The Board is required to prepare and to submit to the taxpayers at the annual meeting for their approval an estimate of the expenses for the ensuing year. Second: An itemized report of expenditures for the past year must be made and published; and it is emphatically stated that no bunching of times is permissible. The order of business at the annual meeting is so arranged that the taxpavers can show their approval or dis approval of such estimates and reports by the re-election or otherwise of the trustees. THE LEDGER believes these requirements are wise and just and hopes to see them fully complied with at future meetings. No creature is greater than its creator; and no body of public servants is superior to those it serves. We have long shared the belief that the United States Senate has divorced itself from the people and is no longer a representative body. Made up largely of millionaires, state bosses and old fossils, several of whom have been convicted of or indicted for crimes, it antagonizes popular reforms and eyen sets itself like a stone wall against the petitions of the people, the demands of state legislatures and the bills of the House of Representatives, for the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people. Having taken the people's money for mis-representating them, it now brazenly inquires: "Why should I resign?" And waits to be kicked from the Capitol it has disgraced. "The Treason of the Senate" is a large topic; and the Cosmopolitan is big enough to handle it.




