> "We have a statute in this state that provides that it shall be unlawful for any person who is not a regular licensed attorney at law in the state to represent himself as an attorney at law, or to use any sign of any kind whatever by which he designates himself as attorney at law, solicitor in chancery, or in any way represent to the public that he is an attor-nev at law, either by speaking or in writing intending to lead such person or persons to believe that he is an attorney at law, and which provides that any persons violating the provision to this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be fined not less than \$50 or more than \$500 and cost of prosecution, or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months.

"In this case, for more than a year the prosecuting attorney has hel! out to the public a man that is in n way competent to appear in the courts of this state, and if there is anything in the law that makes a party that participates in a misdemeanor guilty, they are just as guilty as the young man.

One of these men is now candidate for circuit judge and the other for prosecuting attorney.
"This young man has claimed and

pretended to the public that he was admitted to the bar. He took an examination as late as October 12, this past year and failed to pass. When it was represented by me that he was not an attorney at law and was not qualified, he sent me word that he was admitted to the bar and wanted me to come to his office. [Continued on page 81
