

Gives it Place on Accredited List. Will Furnish Incentive for Better Scholarship.

Word was recently received that at a meeting of the North Central Association of colleges and secondary schools held in Chicago, the Lowell High school was accredited. n our local High school. Lowell has long been on the niversity list, but the North Central list has a wider significance, in that her graduates are eligible to enter any college in the

Futher than this, students may exercise more latitude in elections. By the University arrangment students were required to present credits from certain specfied courses. But the students going from schools from the North Central list simply present a statement from the superintendent or principal to the effect that they are ready for college.

Futher, the new standard has caused Superintendent Frazee to recommend two kinds of diplomas to be issued. One goes to students who have an average of B 85 per cent) or better for their high school course and it is marked "recommended." The other kind goes to all other gradates and is marked "not recommended." This plan enables the faculty to maintain the high standard necessary to remain on the North Central list and at the same time allows students who are not able to make this grade and who never expect to go to graduate. Not only does it protect the prestige of the school from being represented by students who barely squeeze through, but it gives an incentive for better grades to those students who would go away to col-
