Two Detroiters Will Make Race for Senatorship.

NEWBERRY VS FORD

It's Newberry against Ford in the senatorial race, two Detroiters. Newberry won the Republican nomination by a vote, probably equal to that of Osborn and Ford combined; and Ford got the nomi-nation on the Democratic ticket by a long lead from his one opponent, Jas. W. Helme of Adrian. The vote in Lowell and in the state generally was light. Here there were but 213 ballots cast, of which 181 were Republican and 32 Democratic. The Republicans di-vided their votes: Osborn 107, New-berry 50, Ford 20, Simpson 1, while Ford was the choice of most of those casting Democratic ballots. Yesterday's News gives the fol-lowing:

Yesterday's News gives the fol-lowing: Complete returns from Tuesday's primary election, compiled next day in the office of County Clerk Hill, from the official ballots, carried with them some interesting sur-prises, especially in the senatorial race in which Chase S. Osborn leads Truman H. Newberry by 216 votes and Henry Ford by 1,758 votes in Kent county. In the fight for state representa-tive for the First district, the sur-prise came in the remarkable run of William A. Haan, who beat the Newberry slate of Welsh, Mol and DeYoung. Welsh, who managed the Newberry campaign in Kent coun-ty, polled 6,983, Mol third with 3, 966, and DeYoung came fourth with 3,826.

3,826. Peter Viergever lead the list in the fight for sheriff, and received 6,742 votes, and this was a decided sur-prise to those who had watched the political skies. Fred Kelley was picked as a winner, being new in politics and free from all combina-tions and rings. He was backed by men who wanted to see a new busi-ness regime in the sheriff's office. He received but 4,130 votes. Many republicans, however, after

States is delivered by ships. There is produced about 800,000 tons of beet sugar and 250,000 tons of cane sugar in Louisiana. The total consumption of the United States is about 4,500,000 tons of raw sugar, which makes about 4,250,000 tons of refined sugar.

If our coasts were blockaded as Germany's now are, we would have available for the use of the people of the United States only one pound of sugar for every four we use. Under such circumstances there is no doubt that the American.people would get along on this limited supply without complaint.

The United States Food Administration is asking every American household to use not more than two pounds of sugar per person each month for domestic use. Reducing our sugar consumption here means that we will be able to help supply the needs of France, England and Italy. Sugar conservation on the American table also means conservation of ships.

The Army and Navy have sent out an "S. O. S." call for ships. "Save Our Ships to Transport Troops and Munitions to France, in order that we may keep the fighting front where it now is and not allow it to extend to our own homes," is the message.

There is ample sugar in the world for all requirements-in fact, there is a large surplus, but on account of the ship shortage it is not available for use in this country.




