SHOWS HOW COUNTY MAY SAVE DOLLARS.

Secretary Hatten Submits Statistics Revealing Waste of Taxpayers'

Money That a county purchasing agen could save thousands of dollars to Kent county taxpayers, was the argument advanced in communication sent to the bord of supervisors Mon-day by Secretary Hatten of the Grand Rapids Citizens league. Accompanying the communication was a table showing the difference between the buying prices of the city, which has a purchasing agent, and the county's supplyy prices.

According to Hatten's statistics

According to Hatten's statistics the average percentage of increase paid by the county over the city, both high and low prices, is 31.54 per cent. The average percentage of increase paid by the county over the city on low prices is 30.22 per cent. The average percentage of increase paid by the county over city, in high prices, is 32, 86 per

Since Jan. 1, 1919, the county has spent \$12,234.77 for supplies, and would have saved more than \$3,000 through a purchasing agent.

Hatten points out that the 31.54 per cent increase would be more per cent increase would be more than enough to pay the salary of a purchasing agent.

Hatten's Communication.

"Prior to and during the last session of the legislature," Hatten's communication reads, "the Citizens league was active in trying to secure a purchasing agent law for Kent county. The Kent delegation finally united, and the legislature was active in trying to secure a purchasing agent law for Farmer, Home Life, The Household and The Gentle Woman, all one year for \$2.15. passed a law providing for the se-lection of a full time secretary for the board of auditors, who should be the county purchasing agent.
"This law, before becoming effective, must be approved by the voters of Kent county. To secure data for a campaign of publicity to assure the adoption of the law, and also to check the results accomplished by the purchasing agent under our commission form of gov-ernment, Lieut Russell F. Griffen a study of the unit prices prevailing in the city, county and poor depart-
