Fletcher Doesn't Trust Mexico



Warning against premature recognition of the new Mexican government has been given the administration by Henry P. Fletcher, former ambassador to Mexico. In a letter to Bainbridge Colby, secretary of state, he urges that in no case should the recognition of the De la Huerta regime be other than that of a de acto character, with the understanding that even this would be withdrawn should subsequent events prove that was prematurely extended. Mr. Fletcher's letter resulted from
