

and must be content with a salary of \$2,500. By a local act of 1919, declared unconstitutional in the opinion, he had been receiving \$4,000 up to the time the board cut his salary to \$2,500 last fall.

The supervisors now face the quandary of what to do about bringing the salaries of the register of deeds, the treasurer and the county clerk back to \$4,000, from which all probably were reduced to \$2,500 by the ruling of the supreme court.

The supervisors have no desire to cut the salaries of Treasurer Thomas Vidro and Clerk Louis Neumann, but insistence on adherence to the constitution which brought about the present situation will prevent them now from doing anything contrary to the law which fixes the salaries at \$2,500.

It is considered possible a local ordinance might take care of the situation, but at least not until the beginning of the next term which will mean Mr. Neumann, and Mr. Vidro would have to take losses of \$750 each for the remainder of the present term and Mr. Reed would take the same loss in addition to that sustained during the six months his compensation was in controversy.

The supervisors are looking for a way out, but have given no indication yet that they have found a way.

There remains the further detail to clear up what is to be done about the fact that for more than eight years the board perhaps illegally has paid the county officers the additional \$1,500 a year, which totals around \$86,000. The question is if it is constitutionally correct to demand return of this money whether it should come out of the pockets of the luckless public officials or

No definite opinions are being expressed, and there is hope it all may be cleared up with loss to nobody but it is admitted there will have to be some fighting to bring about such a happy conclusion.






