"The spores which are found on the old dead leaves on the ground are ripe and will be ready to discharge by the time the apple buds are in the green stage," he says. "Spore discharges occur only during rains and infections can only take place when the foliage is wet." Three pre-blossom sprays to be made from one week to 10 days apart are recommended. For early sprays, which should be applied now, 2½ gallons of water is effective. The strength can be weakened for the after-blossom sprays. 
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
