



Our office had a number of calls hast week in regard to a reddish brown growth on the red cedar or juniper known as the "cedar apple." This is a fungus disease that lives one stage on the juniper and the other stage on any of the apple tree varieties. The cedar apple stage is a reddish brown growth that discharges spores who when they alight in leaves of the apple that discharges spores who when they alight in leaves of the apple tree make a reddish brown spot, spoiling the appearance of the tree. 

On the landscape tour last week both stages of the disease were found in one yard. The thorn-apple trees were well infected and in a short time will be rather unsightly. Speaking of the wild thornapple O. I. Gregg told the folks on the landscape tour last week that in the Grand River Valley there were over 700 distinct species of this plant. To the layman these distinctions are not apparent but to the trained botanist they are easily seen.
