

Generally we write six to eight pages of paper "copy". Mrs. Sattler types it to about two pages double spaced and has it in the mail on Friday afternoons.

The Kent County rural papers have been nice about printing it. One paper outside of the county uses it.

A Real Log Cabin Camp

4-H Club Camp construction work at Bottwick Lake is far enough along so it is beginning to look like a real log cabin camp.

All concrete work, walls and floors, for eight cabins are finished. Walls are up for four cabins. Roofs are on two. Another is ready for roofing material and the fourth for rafters.

By early fall it is expected that all walls and roofs will be completed and as much more work as possible finished.

When finished no county will have a better located or arranged camp. There are enough logs on hand to finish the eight cabins and to make a good start on a mess hall.

The camp will be used by agricultural and home extension groups and the rural congregational churches in the Grand Rapids area.

The logs used in the construction work were discarded power line poles given by the Consumers Power Company.

Old Sol's Rays Do Double Duty

The extreme heat which had prevailed here and throughout the country for seven days and nights reached a climax last Thursday when thermometers read 90 in the shade and in more exposed places 112 degrees and even higher.

The heat was so bad in the afternoon that one or two of our local plants shut down. Even the brick pavement in one place on East Main-st. bulged up over a space covering several square feet but this damage was repaired the next day.

Thunderstorms accompanied by lightning set in about 7:30 Thursday evening and in less than an hour's time thermometers dropped to about 70. There was some wind and a few shade trees about town were blown down. Hardest hit on Main-st. was the Lowell Creamery which had a window blown in.

Lightning did some damage on various farms, at the Gunther home, a few miles northwest of here, the vital parts of almost everything electrical in the house were burnt out, including refrigerator, range, radio, etc.

But the respite from the rays of Old Sol was of short duration for on Sunday thermometers again registered in the high 90's and each day thereafter up to Tuesday night when another cool wave again brought welcome relief from the heat.

DROP NAME OF COUNTY FROM 1941 AUTO PLATES

**Protect Civil War Trenches**  
To serve the twofold purpose of beautification and prevention of erosion which threaten to damage Civil War trenches, thousands of blossoming periwinkle were planted in the Fredericksburg-Spotylvania National Military Park.

Since the matting of underbrush, which for more than 80 years held the earth in place and made a wilderness of the historic battlefields, has been removed, national park service officials have been combating the menace of erosion.

Branch Spalding, co-ordinating superintendent of the Virginia battlefields, said the periwinkle was a little evergreen that produces tiny white blossoms in late April. Mr. Spalding said that through the operation of park neighbors, hundreds of roots were gathered for planting.

**Antarctica Will Become Tropical, Predicts Byrd**  
Millions of years ago Antarctica had a tropical climate, according to Adm. Richard E. Byrd, the famous explorer.

The climate, moreover, is changing, he says, and that region again will become habitable.

But don't make any rush for Little America as yet. It will take some millions of years, Byrd declares, till it's warm enough for you.

Byrd brought back from his recent expedition geological and botanical fossils of wood and leaves to prove the antarctic once was tropical. He said fossil animals might be found if the polar ice cap could be excavated. However, he said it was not possible to prove human existence there.

The far southern continent is passing through a glacial age and the ice is slowly diminishing, Byrd declared. Shepherds in Chilean Patagonia had told him, too, that the ice and snow was less now than a generation ago, he added.

As the ice diminishes in Antarctica, Byrd said, the temperature will gradually rise through the centuries, and possibly the currents which give sub-tropical Chile and Peru their temperate climate will become warmer.



The extension department issued 426,350 of the bulletins, while the Experiment Station had 357,627 copies. Distribution is by personal request in the bulletin office, by mail, and through the extension offices in Michigan's 83 counties. Schools, libraries and a selected list also receive the bulletins. Mrs. Lois Knowlton is in charge of the office.

**Rosin And Turpentine**

### Odds and Ends About Michigan

A planting of 30,000 lake trout fry 18 years ago is believed the basis of the thrilling sport of deep sea fishing—on a 30-acre lake at Harrison in the heart of central Michigan. The lake is Towline lake, four miles east of Harrison, small but nearly 60 feet deep. Biggest of the recent lake trout catches is a 34-inch, 16-pounder landed by Mrs. J. M. Rockwell of Flint.

In Michigan's 87 dairy herd improvement associations, 93 per cent of the herd owners used registered bulls in breeding to improve their herd productions of milk and butterfat.

In the first six months of 1940, there have been almost as many fatal accidents in the home as on the highway. The Michigan Department of Health figures for accidental deaths from January through June show 689 motor vehicle fatalities on the highways and 673 fatal accidents in the home.

Test drilling for oil at a depth twice as deep as the present deepest commercially producing well is underway in Monitor township of Bay county. The oil company putting down the well is seeking oil in the Trenton formation, at about 9,000 feet. Where this formation is nearest the surface in Monroe county, it has showed oil.

According to the monthly reports received from 14 federal-state egg grading stations throughout Michigan, another record was established during June with 619,440 dozen eggs being graded during the month. This surpasses the former record established in May when 566,385 dozen were inspected and graded.
