The United States Must Halt March of Communism If It Is Going To Prevent Its Spread resident of Lowell for the past 20

Editor's Note: Last week's news-letter presented, by fortunate coincidence, the prospect of a showdown between Democracy and Communism. Here is a follow-up, hot off the griddle, as fresh as tomorrow's headlines. We believe it has high readership.
