If in combining the small grain, the straw was left high and tends to smother out the alfalfa seeding, mow the straw just above the tops of the alfalfa plants. Mowing would also kill off any weeds before they go to seed. Mowing should not be done after August.

September is the month during which any alfalfa that will be used for hay or pasture should not be grazed or cut. It is this month that the plants store up food in the roots to carry them through the winter months. We have had some calls of late regarding the seeding of alfalfa in wheat. We know some folks have successfully grown alfalfa this way but in general it is a risky husiness. 
