Vital to Nation Recent price advances and the unsettled international situation have made wool both a valuable farm product and a raw material vitally needed in our defense pro-

gram. Michigan State College sheep specialist Graydon Blank says that farmers who keep sheep will want to make every effort to produce quality wool. This means keeping it free from chaff and other objectional foreign material so the wool will bring the top price and be of most use for military require-

ments. Hay and other roughage should be fed from a rack with sides which will not let chaff get into the wool. Another method is to feed hay and other roughage on the ground, some distance from the barn. This helps to keep chaff from the wool and also helps the flock to get needed exercise. Under no circumstances should hay be car ried over the backs of the sheep Blank cautions. Sheep should be housed only in well ventilated sheds. When housed too close or under poorly ventilated conditions, the tips of the fleeces are stelled and the solutions.
