Combine 6 tablespoons brown sugar, butter or margarine and I tablespoon water in 9-in. layer pan. Spread batter on top. Let rise until light (about 30 minutes). Bake in moderate oven (375°F) about 30 minutes. Turn out upside down. Makes I coffee cake.
