The proposed constitutional mendment for reapportionment will be on the ballot at the November 4 election, according to the Michigan Committee for a balanced

In less than a month, more than 100,000 signatures over and above the minimum required were obtained. This indicates a ground speak in November for the balanced legislature plan.

A total of 187,939 signatures is required to place the proposed constitutional amendment on the November general election ballot,

Two New Senate Seats

The plan proposes to leave the Senate remain as at present with the addition of two new seats, one representing Oakland and the other Macomb counties. It proposes to reapportion the House on the basis of population, increasing house membership by up to ten new members.

It will continue to give recognition to county boundary lines. The provision (moiety) permits a unit. It proposes to district Detroit in a fair fashion.
