Happenings In Lowell's Past... The first steamboat, the Paragon, was launched in the Grand river in 1838, and ran through Lowell, between Grand Rapids and Lyons. One of the best ice skating rinks in Michigan was located here in Lowell in 1884,

when skating was "the rage". The gristmill on the East bank of Flat river, South of Main Street at the end of the bridge, is Lowell 's oldest landmark, built in 1847.

Lowell was founded in the Spring of 1831, by Daniel Marsac, a "Free Trader" of
