Many new features dominated the scene at the Lowell 4-H Fair this week, where about 1,800 youngsters exhibited over 4,000 entries in Michigan's largest 4-H Fair. Most interesting is the new competition of riding horses in the rural scene. This year's horse exhibit nearly equal the dairy class. The most apparent addition is the new 1,350-seat grandstand which was designed by General Manager Tom Lyons. A new and more convenient office is located in the main 4-H building where all exhibits are now displayed. The Quonset building is not used for exhibition this year but only for leaders' headquarters and serving food.

At the other end of the grounds, sheep, rabbits, poultry, horses and cattle are located. A huge 180-ft. tent was erected to house the increased amount of horses.

Approximately 225 4-H leaders were on the grounds supervising and helping to get the projects on display. Ralph E. Kirch is the coordinator of the 4-H program with Don L. Hine and Eleanor J. Wojciechowski assisting in their respective fields.

Some 20 judges awarded premium money and ribbons to each entry. By Wednesday afternoon all judging had been completed except the dairy breeds and showmanship classes. Allocation and other funds will provide about \$11,000 in prizes. It was believed that crowds may exceed the 25,000 originally estimated.

Traffic Must Stop For School Bus, States New Law

A new Michigan law has been passed requiring traffic from both directions to stop for school buses while loading or unloading passengers. The law also states that school buses must carry two large red, alternately flashing lights high on the front and rear, to give warning that it is slowing for a stop.

Beginning September 13, when the law goes into effect, traffic following and approaching the bus must stop. But there are some exceptions. On divided highways, traffic overtaking a bus must stop but those from the opposite direction do not.

At intersections where traffic is controlled by a stop-and-go light or by an officer, traffic is not required to stop if a bus stops on a green light or if an officer directs traffic to continue, but maximum speed allowed is 10 miles an hour.

Although the law does not go into effect until two weeks after school begins, drivers should pay special attention to children as they will be depending on traffic to stop for them.

Showboat Balloon Found in N. Y. State



Remember the balloons that the Showboat Chorus released after the performance each night? Well, one of them was found in Cattaraugus, New York by Cornelius W. Kuhn. State Highway Project Office Opened Here

The State Highway Department opened a project office here this week in the Christiansen Building, George Littell, Project Engineer in charge of the office.

This office will be headquarters for the State Highway men working on the new US-16 super-highway, being constructed from the Kent-Ionia County line south of Lowell to the intersection of Whitneville Road and the present US-16.

Twelve to fifteen field personnel will work out of this office while this project is being constructed, which is expected to be for a year, or more.

As soon as construction is underway, all roads leading south are expected to be closed off except a detour built at M-50, where the only point of access on this 8 1/2 mile stretch of super-highway will be built.

When the work is finished, it will be possible to cross the super US-16 at Segwun Ave., and Morse Lake Road, as well as at the M-50 access point.

Contracts for this bridge work and the divided four lanes of highway will be given out September 3. The bridge over the C & O Railroad near the Kent-Ionia County line will be let on a separate contract. Many have wondered how the new super-highway would go across the Pratt Lake peat bog, but at this point the road makes a wide circle to the south, staying on high ground. It then swings back to a point about a half-mile south of the present US-16.

Lowell to Get \$4,219.87 From State Highway Dept.

The village of Lowell will receive \$4,219.87 from the State Highway Department Motor Vehicle Fund for the second quarter of 1958. The money is collected from state gasoline, weight and Diesel fuel taxes and is distributed to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages after deductions for non-highway uses and collection costs are taken out.

Total amount for state, county and village highway departments is over \$39 million.

Rowe said he braked his car and swerved to the left lane but could not avoid striking the bicycle.

Stephens said that excessive loads stopped after Mr. Hautala investigated. The Commissioner stated that the weigh-masters may have found that the vehicles were over the legal limit. Most of the damage has been done on the north section of the bridge. At first glance one can see that the north end of this section of girders bears most and the south end bears least. Hautala observed that this condition had been there for some time although the excessive weight may have caused further harm.

The Commissioner confirmed Stephens' statement that should those trucks hit a bump on the supports, the bridge might cave in. He felt though that the bridge is safe if and until the Lansing unit claims otherwise. "Now that everyone's attention has been brought to it, everything will be all right," he declared.

The lower bridge was repaired last spring when a new floor was put in, and other improvements made. After that, load limits were taken off but will be put on again if the State Highway Commission deems it necessary.

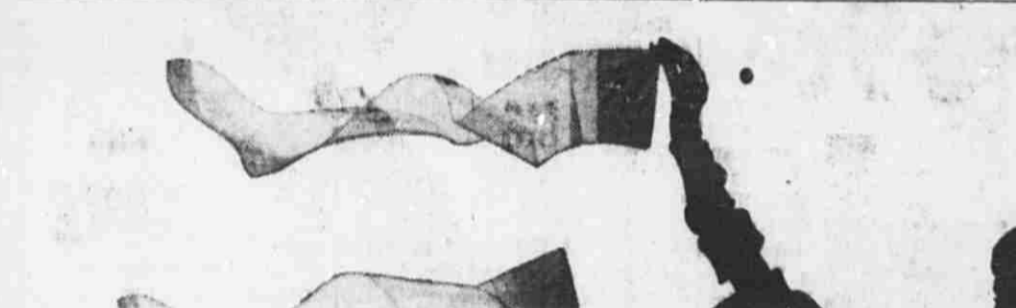

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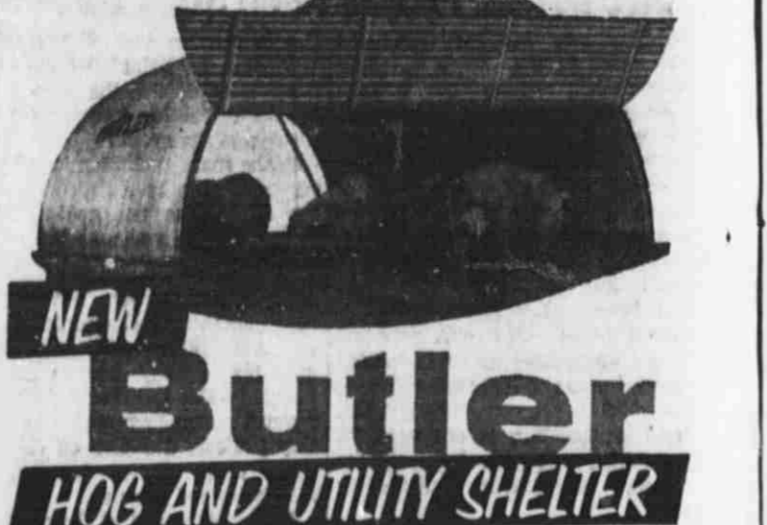

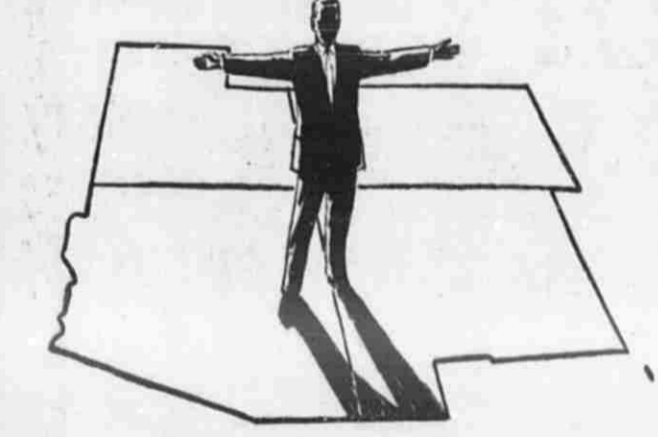

148 Participated in Fluoride Program

The topical Fluoride Program, being held at the Alto school for the past two weeks, ended Tuesday, August 12.

A Jack Vander Wal, a pre-dental student from the University of Michigan, has been giving the treatments assisted by Sharon Dintaman, approximately 148 children participated from Harris Creek, Whitneyville, Alto, Logan, Sweet, Love, Bowne Center, Morse Lake, and Merriman schools.

Those assisting in setting up the program were Mr. and Mrs. Paul Smith, Mrs. Marian Overholt, Mrs. Marie Dearford, and Mrs. Paul Dintaman.

A series of four applications of sodium fluoride was given each youngster. This reduces tooth decay as much as 40 per cent in groups of children. Treatments at about 3-year intervals will help safeguard new teeth that have been replacing the primary teeth during those years.

Treatments will be given at the school again next year for those who weren't the right age this year.
