Accept Teachers Resignation

The Lowell Board of Education on Monday night voted to accept the resignation of high school teacher Raymond B. Avery who has been in the local system for 32 years. The board revealed at the meeting that they had requested Avery to appear before the board before any contract negotiations would be instituted for the coming year. The members of the board had questions they wanted answered regarding Mr. Avery's marking system. He submitted his resignation to the board in a letter in which he refused to appear at a meeting of the board of education. The board voted to accept his resignation.

Call for Enlarged Gym
The school board approved a revision in the plans for the new high school which would increase the size of the gym to 92 feet in width and would allow seating of 1736 spectators instead of the 1400 originally planned. This change was estimated by the architect, Don Palmer, to cost about \$15,000; this will be presented as an alternate in the bidding. The board approved a change in the plans that will allow two serving lines in the school cafeteria and then gave their final approval of the overall plans for the new high school.

The State Department of Public Instruction has given their approval of the school building plans and site and the bonds to finance the project. All that remains now is the approval of the State Finance Commission and the bonds can be sold.

Mrs. Rowell Quits Teaching
The board received a communication from Mrs. Ann Rowell, vocal music instructor in the high school, announcing that she will not be able to teach here next year. She told the board that her duties in assisting her husband who is pastor of the Alto and Bowne Center Methodist churches would take too much of her time.

Other teachers not returning in the high school are John Ickes who is going to Marshall next year to teach; and Charles Hale who is joining the U. S. Coast Guard.

Lowell's varsity baseball team stormed through another Tri-River opponent Tuesday afternoon defeating Comstock Park 9-4. Lowell mated Comstock Park's highly touted John Peless and scored in every inning but the fourth. Peless who had struck out 18 and 15 in his two previous winning starts, struck out three Lowell batters before being knocked out of the box in the fifth inning after pitching to three batters all of whom reached base.

Catch Vern Morse started Lowell's pitching ace, Don Dilly, who pitched a brilliant three innings, striking out eight out of nine batters. When the score reached 6-1 at the end of the third inning, Coach Vern Morse pulled Dilly in favor of Ron Raymor who finished the ball game for Lowell. Dilly will start again Thursday in Lowell's home encounter with Cedar Springs.

Dilly again led the Lowell batting assault with a home run, triple, and sacrifice fly. Lowell's catcher, Larry Miller, did another outstanding job behind the plate for Lowell and threw out both Comstock Park baserunners who attempted to steal. This gives Miller five baserunners thrown out in the last three ball games. Lowell has now completed its first round of play and has a 5-0 record.

Lowell's lack of performance in the field events was costly. Rockford led at the beginning of the running events 27 and one-third to 8 and one-third. High School Driver Education Program Receives Certificate For Excellence

The Lowell Area Schools this week received a notice of an award certificate from the Department of Public Instruction for excellence in its Driver Education program. This award is given by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, which also awarded the state of Michigan the first Excellence award ever given. Runner-up awards were made to Delaware, Florida, Kansas, Maine, North Carolina and Utah.

Lowell Area Schools began offering Driver Education in 1948-49 with Mr. Charles White as the instructor. Forty-five students passed the course that year. In 1950-51 Mr. Burch became the instructor and as the program grew Mr. Howe was hired as an assistant. Presently Mr. Burch and Mr. Kelly are the instructors. Last summer one hundred twenty students were passed under this program—a total of nine hundred twenty-two (922) since 1948 have graduated from this Driver Education program.

Applications for one hundred sixty (160) students have been made for this summer's course. One group has just finished the book work, classes being held from 7 to 9 each evening for a total of thirty class hours. Mr. Kelly is in charge of this part of the program.

Mr. Burch is in charge of the driving program. To pass this phase of the course each student must have six hours "behind the wheel" along with the thirty hours of classroom work.

In order to obtain a driver's license in Michigan a person must be eighteen years of age, or he can qualify at age sixteen if he has passed a course in Driver Education. Any youth who is fifteen before June 1 is eligible to enroll in the Lowell Driver Education program. Interested students for this year have selected the period for the book and driving course with Mr. Charles White as the instructor. Forty-five students passed the course that year. In 1950-51 Mr. Burch became the instructor and as the program grew Mr. Howe was hired as an assistant. Presently Mr. Burch and Mr. Kelly are the instructors. 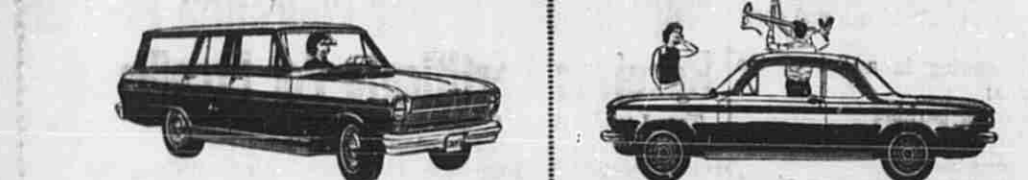

A candidate getting petitions filled in an election in cities and townships need a very small amount of names to qualify and it is no chore whatsoever for almost any candidate to get these within a matter of an hour or so.

At least a sticker candidate must have the stickers and the questionnaires ruled by the State Fair Elections Commission as unfair. Should the Wyoming City

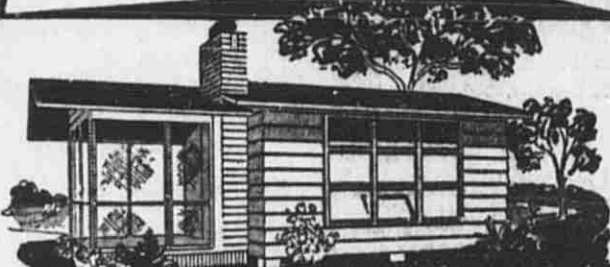
