

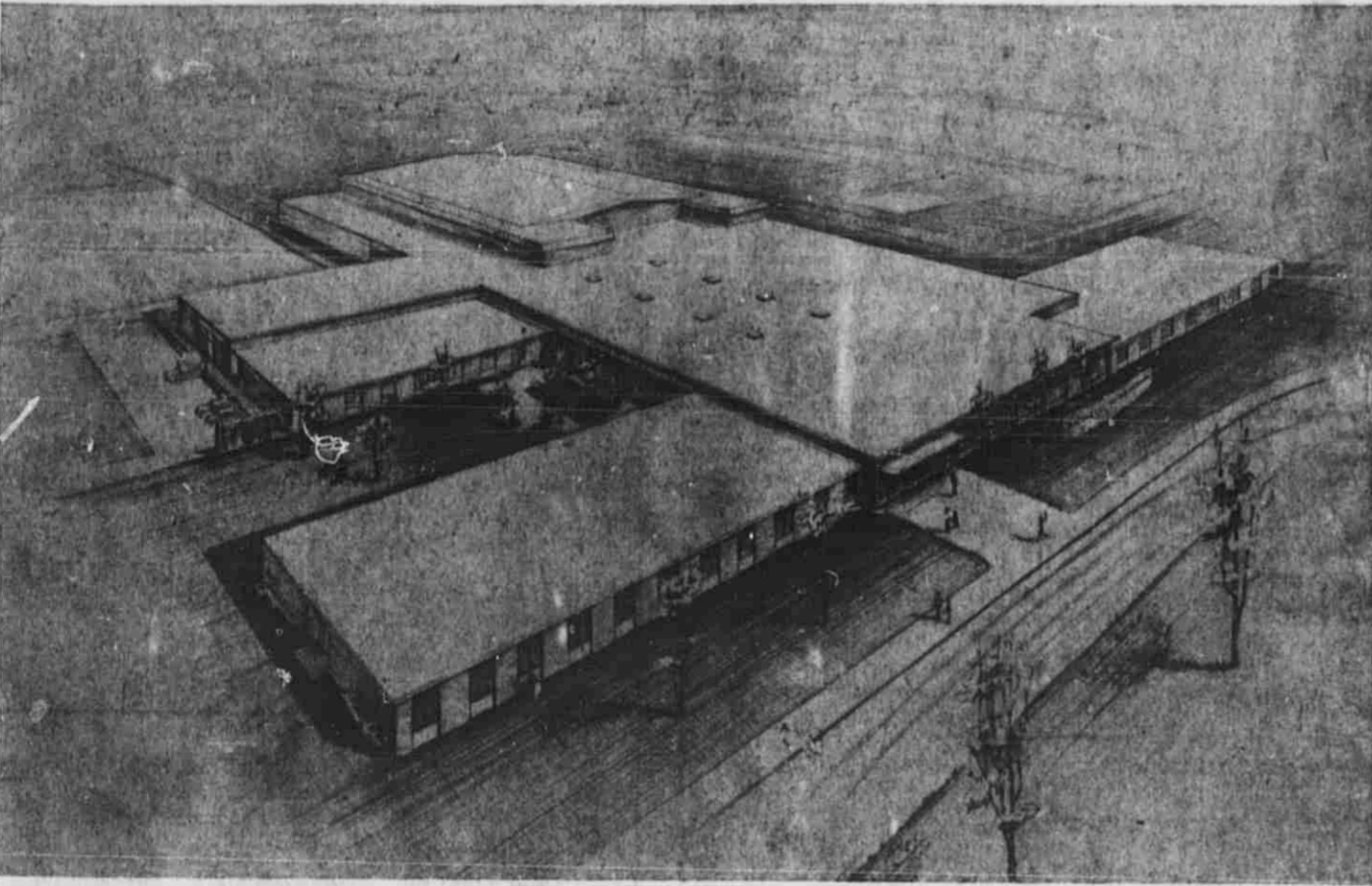

Award High School Contracts



Construction got underway this week on the new million-dollar Lowell High School when the Lowell Board of Education awarded the general construction bid to Beckering Construction Co. of Grand Rapids Monday for \$498,720. Bid on the mechanical trades went to Holwerda Plumbing and Heating of Grand Rapids for \$213,353, and the electrical bid went to Johnson Electric of Grand Rapids for \$68,783. The total construction bid is therefore \$780,856. Members of the school board, announced that they were very happy with the bids on the new school because they were well below the architects' estimates. The cost per square foot comes to less than \$11.00, and preliminary estimates on similar schools have run around \$12.00 per square foot. Earl Beckering, head of the construction company, attended the meeting of the board of education and, when awarded the job of building the new school, said he would start work at once and

have the school ready for use in September of 1963. **Building of High Quality** With the bids coming in well below the preliminary estimates, the board of education was not forced to cut down the quality of the building as it was first thought might be necessary. The new building will incorporate all the best features of economical maintenance and be sized for the growth of the school population. The construction costs include all paving of drives and a 150 car parking lot, which will cost \$16,300; brick wainscoting in halls and cafeteria, which totals \$12,500; as well as ceramic tile in the kitchen and toilets and vinyl tile in all class rooms. All the water used in the building will be run through a water softener which was bid at \$3,799. The stage in the 300-seat auditorium will have a professional type lighting and dimming controls. It was thought that all these items might have to be omitted if construction costs were too high. Another feature the board was able to include in the building was a sound system for the entire building which will enable the principal's office to contact every room in the building. The low bid on this was by Eastown Sound for \$5,206. Another bid received but not acted upon was that for kitchen equipment. The low bidder, for \$16,749, was made by Douglas Brothers. This equipment and other furnishings for the new school will be purchased as construction gets underway. **Break Down of Costs** Using the architects' preliminary estimates on the school costs, it appears at this time that the school will cost an estimated \$1,017,312. E. S.

Directors elected at large are Mrs. Walter Hayes, Mrs. Alfred Thomet, Mrs. Bernard Dudley, G. H. Walgren, Leon McVey, James Boylen, Harold Gietzen, Walter VanderWulp, Fred Dalstra, and John Adriansse. McPherson has called a meeting of the trustees at the Ada Town Hall at 8 p. m., August 23, at which time officers of the group will be elected. Present at the August 7 meeting was John Keavanaugh of the Michigan Economic Development Bureau, who stated before the group that the housing project for the elderly was a tremendous step forward in Ada's growth and would surely give great impetus to further community development. Also present was Paul Bowers of the architectural firm of Wold and Bowers in Grand Rapids. Mr. Bowers discussed the sites and general planning. McPherson announced that a public meeting will be held to inform the community of the progress of the housing project on September 4 at 8 p. m. in Egypt Hall.

Following this, a second outbreak of fire at the Timpson Orchard occurred in the afternoon between 4 and 5 p.m. Saturday noon a grass fire at the rear of St. Mary's school kept the firemen busy for a short time.

There Goes Summer! Bookstore Opening First Sign That School Is Slated To Start September 4

The Lowell Area Schools' bookstore will open Monday, August 20, and will be serving students 9-12 a. m. and from 1-4 p. m., Stephen Nisbet, Lowell superintendent, announced this week.

Individual teachers, Nisbet said. Rental charges will be \$7.50 for first- and second-grade students, \$7.00 for third and fourth graders, and \$7.25 for fifth- and sixth-grade children. No charge will be made for kindergarten students. These charges, Nisbet explained, include Weekly Readers and work books, as well as paper and pencils in grades 1 and 2. The children will be asked to make their rental payments to their teacher during the first week of school, Nisbet said. The superintendent then explained that these payments should be made early so that the teachers need not spend too much time on rental collections once school gets underway.

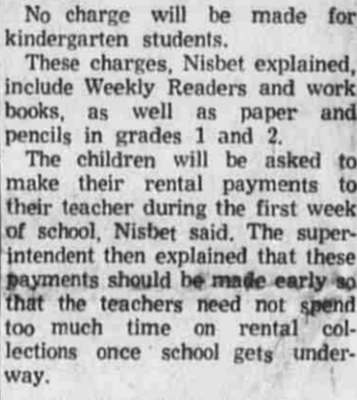

To Join Cascade Animal Hospital

Roy William Westcott, D.V.M., a veterinarian in the Lowell area for the past five years, will be associated with Richard D. Siegle, D.V.M., at the Cascade Animal Hospital and Veterinary Farm Service as of September 1, it was recently announced. Westcott will leave his position as Disease Control Supervisor for



the Michigan Department of Agriculture to join Dr. Siegle in the Cascade practice. Siegle has been practicing in the Alto area for 23 years and has operated the Cascade animal facility for seven years. Born in Detroit on May 22, 1921, Westcott was educated in the Detroit school system and graduated from Cooley High School. Charge Rockford Man With Statutory Rape of Eight-Year-Old Lowell Girl

Prompt action by Lowell Police last week brought charges against Oscar Schieb, 41, 7000 Belding Road, Rockford, in the alleged rape Wednesday noon of an 8-year-old Lowell girl. Schieb waived examination Friday before Municipal Court Judge Louis E. Simhauser on a charge of statutory rape and was bound over to Circuit Court under a \$10,000 bond. He is being held in the Kent County Jail pending posting of bond. Avery Block, Lowell Deputy Po-

lice Chief, told the Ledger that local police were notified Wednesday evening by the girl's parents. 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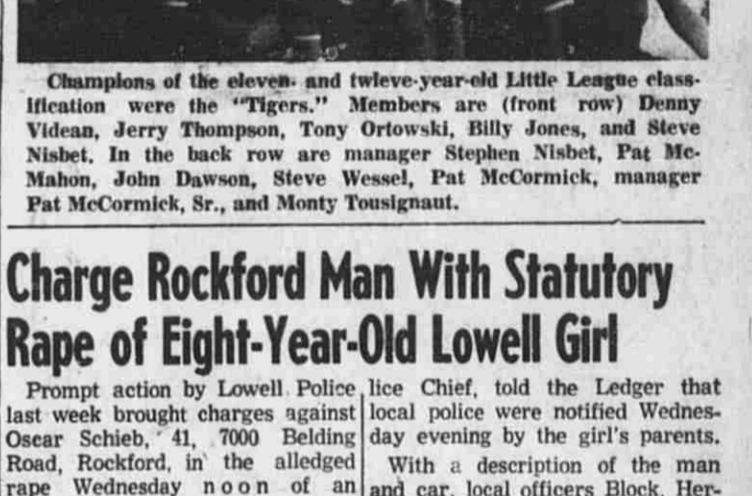
