# School girls admit Fire damages bomb threat here

Two Forest Hills high school girls, ages 14 and 16, who had skipped school on Wednesday, January 12, admitted to Kent County Sheriff's officers this week that they had called a bomb threat to the Lowell Junior high school on January 12.

The girls have been turned over to Probate Court for action; this is a felony and not a misdeamor, as many may

The girls were discovered when a letter written to a boy friend, fell into the hands of the Lowell Police Department. The letter described the bomb threat and gave the girl's first names. The police were able to find the girls from this information.

Diabetes can be controlled and the sooner it is detected, the better chance for a normal life. The test itself takes only a few min-

Pete Kerr, owner of the tavern, said he had only closed for the night and gone upstairs to his apartment, a short time before the fire was discovered at 3 a. m.

He smelled smoke and by the time he got down stairs, the glass in the front windows were cracked from the heat, and the bar was in flames,

Fire Chief Frank Baker reported that the fire is believed to have started from a motor on a compressor located under the bar. It took the fire department about an hour to ex-

tinguish the blaze. The zero temperature found many of the fire men reluctant to crawl out of bed so the fire siren had to be sounded twice, before enough help showed up

to fight the blaze. The tavern had been completely remodeled last spring and the blaze completed ruined the interior of the barroom.

The voting will be on a county-wide basis, with all the yes and no votes in the entire county reorganization being counted as one unit.





# Deane Baker runs for GOP nomination

Deane Baker, 40 year-old vice president of Sommerville Con-struction Company of Grand Rapids and Ada, announced Wednesday he will run for the GOP Senate nomination.

Mr. Baker, a native of Marquette is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and Harvard Business School.
